Dr. Harry T. Terrill was born in New York, ~~Sept.~~ June 17, 1868, and died in Spokane, Washington, August 21, 1934, after an illness of only a few hours.

At the age of 11 years, he moved with his family to Colorado, where he resided until about 1910, when he came to Kalispell to make his home. On July 11, 1891, he was married to Miss G. Wooley, and to them were born two children, Maude Irene, now Mrs. Simpson of Kalispell, and Harold, who was drowned June 6, 1916. His wife passed away November 7, 1920.

Four years later at Spokane, Washington, he was married to Miss Catherine Bruce December 14, 1924 and with the exception of a brief residence in California, where he had gone in pursuit of better health, he made his home in Spokane. Death came suddenly. He had been treating patients only the day before his death.

Besides the immediate family, he is survived by two brothers, C. F. Terrill of Oregon City, Oregon, and Robert, of Golden, Colorado, two grandchildren, Harold and Raymond Simpson of Kalispell, and a host of friends. He was a member of the fraternal order A. O. U. W.

### FUNERAL SERVICES FOR OTTO TINKEL TO BE SATURDAY

Funeral services for Lieutenant Otto S. Tinkel will be held Saturday afternoon in the Sherman & Son chapel. The Masonic lodge will conduct ritualistic services at the Conrad Memorial cemetery where interment will be made.

The Spokesman Review gives the following account of Lieutenant Tinkel's death:

Lieutenant Otto S. Tinkel, 34, former Spokane man and Lewis and Clark graduate, met his death in New York Friday as the result of a skull fracture suffered in some kind of accident the police now are investigating, according to word received through the Associated Press last night.

"The army officer was born at Kalspell, Montana, and came to Spokane with his family in 1915. Previously he had lived at Coner d'Alene. He entered West Point academy in 1918 and graduated in 1922. He was No. 3 in his class. Later he obtained his electrical engineering degree from Cornell university and took post graduate studies at Columbia and the Massachusetts Institute of Technology. For the last two years Lieutenant Tinkel was instructor of chemistry and electricity at West Point.

"His mother died here in 1925. His father, Fred W. Tinkel, a retired insurance man, resides at the Silliman hotel. One sister, Mrs. J. W. Stevens, lives at Issaquah.

"Police investigation of the accident showed that Lieutenant Tinkel came to New York Thursday afternoon and went to the home of a friend, Julius Davenport, in Greenwich Village, says the Associated Press. Davenport told the police that Tinkel left the house that night and did not return until Friday morning. His face was bloody and bruised and his shirt was stained with blood, Davenport told Detective James Hayden.

"He fell asleep at once and Davenport thought it would be better not to awaken him. When Tinkel did not awake by late afternoon Davenport summoned an ambulance. The ambulance attendant found Tinkel to be in a coma. He was taken to the Bellevue hospital, where he died that night.

"An autopsy disclosed a fractured skull. It was said at homicide headquarters that Tinkel's movements had been traced and would be made public when they could be verified."

Elza Tway was born August 21, 1874 at London, Ohio. After graduating from the public schools at London he attended Valparaiso university and followed the teaching profession for a number of years. In 1902 he came to the Flathead country of Montana and entered the employ of the Great Northern Railroad company, in whose service he remained until about two years ago when he retired on account of broken health.

In July, 1908, he married Anna Burns of Kallispell, and to them was born one daughter, Dorothy, now Mrs. E. T. Barrett of Glendive, Montana.

He loved the mountains and woods and spent many days rambling along the streams and lakes. He possessed those rare personal qualities that won without effort the esteem of those he met. His unflinching courtesy, his pleasant smile and words of recognition were free to all and he had a sincerity of purpose and a heart that overflowed. He had the gift of sparkling conversation, and always his presence was assurance of a happy occasion. Even through the long months of suffering his sense of humor and sunny disposition never failed and he remained cheerful to the very last.

He passed away on the evening of March 20, 1934 at the age of 59 years. Besides his widow and daughter he leaves two sisters, Mrs. Mary Broberg of Florida, and Margaret Tway of Columbia Falls, Montana, and three brothers, Joseph and Albert of Ohio, and Ross Tway of Minot, North Dakota.
