He then moved to a farm in the Creston district, where he was living at the time of his death, Wednesday, April 11, 1934, at the age of 74 years.

On December 25, 1895 he was married to Miss Bird M. Porter, and to them were born two sons, DeWitt Clark of Creston, and Porter Clark, who died in infancy. He had a cheerful, generous, friendly disposition, although he had poor health most of his life. He possessed a good singing voice and joined the Methodist church when a young man, taking an active part in the church whenever his health permitted.

He leaves to mourn his loss his wife, Bird M. Clark; his son, DeWitt Clark; three grandchildren, Allan Warren and Elaine Clark, all of Creston; two sisters and two brothers, Eva Slingerling, Edith Bowen, and Clarence Clark, all of Portland, Oregon; and Henry Clark of Seattle, Wash.
