Obituary

Lowrie L. Davis, son of Lory C. Davis and Mary Miller Davis, was born December 5, 1862, at Charlemont, Massachusetts. Owing to the death of his father in the Civil war he was adopted at the age of 6 by A. C. Baker, who raised him as one of his own children. After attending the public school and academy in his home state he came west to Nebraska in the early eighties where he engaged in farming and stock-raising. March 4, 1888, he was married to May Hager. To them was born one son, Allen H. Davis, who lives at Baker, Oregon.

In the early spring of 1903 Mr. Davis came to the Flathead valley and located with his family on a ranch north of Kalispell. After a few years of ranching and stock-raising he bought his home on First avenue east and moved to Kalispell where he engaged in general contracting for several years, finally going into the logging and lumbering business near Dickey lake. About 1921 he sold out his lumber interests and he and Mrs. Davis entered the real estate and insurance business and was one of the incorporators of the firm of Davis & Ellis.

His immediate surviving relatives are his son, Allen H. Davis, two granddaughters, Dorothy and Virginia, a sister, Mrs. Flora Hawks, in Massachusetts and six nephews and nieces in California and Massachusetts.

Interment was in the Conrad cemetery beside his wife who died two years ago.
