**FRED S. RYCKMAN**

Funeral services for Fred S. Ryckman, Indian agent at Cranbrook, who was killed when his automobile was struck by a Great Northern train at Eureka recently, were held at Cranbrook last Thursday. The funeral was held under the auspices of the Masonic lodge, and the body was shipped to Vancouver for cremation. The Cranbrook Courier gives the following account of his life.

Born in Watertown, Ontario 47 years ago, Mr. Ryckman came to East Kootenay with his parents when a small boy. He was at one time employed by the Crow's Nest Railway, but in 1912 entered the service of the Department of Indian Affairs as constable, and in 1931 was appointed to the position of Indian agent.

"Mr. Ryckman in his 23 years in the Indian service, made an enviable reputation for himself. He made a study of the conditions of the Indians, as well as their language, and the Indians grew to hold him in high regard, and this was the case in all five reservations under his jurisdiction. At the St. Eugene Indian school those in charge were grief stricken over his tragic death. They found him an efficient and honest official, eager at all times to promote any project tending to improve the living conditions of the children on the reserve. Indians, young and old, had complete confidence in him.

He was a past grand master of the Cranbrook Masonic lodge, and a past deputy grand master. He is survived by his widow, four children, and four sisters and two brothers."

Mrs. Arthur Burge of Columbia Falls, was a sister of Mr. Ryckman. He had frequently visited her here, and was well known to many in this county, as well as in St. Ignace and Dixon.
