As a great shock to her many friends came the news of the untimely death of Mrs. Robert W. Beasley, which occurred at Denver, Colorado, Saturday. Mrs. Beasley's death followed a major operation, performed a week previously.

The body was sent to Pullman and funeral services were held on Thursday afternoon at 2 o'clock from the United Presbyterian church.

Mrs. Beasley was a native of Pullman and the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. L. W. Dawson, pioneer residents of this community. She was born April 18, 1904, and graduated from Pullman high school. In 1926 she received a degree in English from the State college and following graduation taught in the Pomerooy schools, later accepting a position as student secretary of the United Presbyterian church here.

On June 4, 1930, she was united in marriage to Robert W. Beasley, also a State college graduate, and they moved to Chicago, where Mr. Beasley did graduate work at the University of Chicago and served as director of the clearing house for unemployed in the City of Chicago. Mrs. Beasley engaged herself in social service work and was probation officer for the juvenile courts of Cook county.

Later Mr. and Mrs. Beasley moved to Cheyenne, Wyoming, where he served a year as state director of relief work prior to his acceptance of the position of deputy manager of health and charity at Denver, Colo.

Mrs. Beasley was a woman of beautiful character and keen intelligence and her untimely and unexpected death is mourned by hundreds of friends in this community who knew her from childhood. She was active in the work of the United Presbyterian church during her long residence here and during her high school and college days, was a leader in student activities.
