MRS. DAN DOODY

Funeral services for Mrs. Dan Doody, who died of pneumonia last Thursday, were held at the Waggener & Campbell chapel Saturday afternoon at 2:30.

Mrs. Doody, who was 82 years of age, was survived by no relatives in this part of the country, but she had many friends, especially in the northern part of the county, where she had lived for many years, who did all possible for her during her illness.

Mrs. Doody was born in Macon, Georgia, and she and Mr. Doody came to this county in 1894, and settled on a homestead seven miles east of Belton in what is now Glacier park. Mr. Doody often acted as a guide for hunting parties, and was well known to prominent men in all parts of the United States. After the park was created he was appointed as a park ranger, in which capacity he served until his death 15 years ago. Since his death Mrs. Doody had continued to live in the old home until her recent illness when she was brought to the Sisters' hospital in Kallispell.

The bearers were from among Mrs. Doody's old friends, and interment was made in Conrad Memorial cemetery.
