### Obituary

Louis Fehlberg, pioneer resident of the Flathead, passed away at his farm home last Saturday after an illness of several months. Mr. Fehlberg was 79 years old. Although ailing, his death came as a distinct shock to his numerous friends in the Flathead.

Mr. Fehlberg is survived by his widow, Amanda Fehlberg; three sons, Carl and Fred, who lived with him, and Louis, Jr., of Marion; two daughters, Mrs. H. H. Bellefleur of Creston and Mrs. David M. Stevens of Helena; a sister, Mrs. Mary Brown of Seattle, and two brothers, August of Kalispell and Theodore, who lives in Germany. One daughter, Amanda, died in 1917.

Mr. Fehlberg was born in Germany in 1858. Coming to America in 1882, he followed his profession of pharmacy in Cedar Rapids, Iowa, until 1889 when he came to the Flathead. In that year, almost half a century ago, he took up the beautiful farm at Creston where he has made his home since. Mrs. Fehlberg came to join him in 1892.

He helped organize the Equity Cooperative organization, of which he was a director for a number of years. He also organized the East Side Telephone company and served on the board of directors.

Mr. Fehlberg was always a progressive man, striving to make the community in which he lived a better place for those who followed.
