Laura was brought quickly to Kalispell where first-ald was promptly given, and for several weeks little hope was held out for her recovery, but through her indomitable will, and the medical sxill of attending physicians, with constant attention of her devoted parents she rallied, and exhibiting cheerfulness and bravery, rare under such circumstances for one so young, Laura steeled herself to the ordeal of assisting the helping hands which tried so hard to alleviate her suffering.

Throughout the months her condition gradually improved and all who knew her were happy in the thought that complete recovery was at last in sight, but unforseen complications developed late last Saturday night and she passed suddenly and pencefully to a well deserved relief from almost a year of continual pain.
