#### Obituary

James O'Boyle was born March 15, 1848 on the Earl of Antrim's estate at Deerpark, Glenarm Co. Antrim, Ireland, the eldest child of a family of 13 children born to Charles and Margaret (McNell) O'Boyle.

At the age of 21, Mr. O'lloyle left his home and came to the United States, settling first at Omaha, Nebraska, for a time, then going to Marysville, Kansas, where he lived two years. He then decided to come west and left St. Joseph, Missours, sailing on the steamboat "Nellie Peck" and landing at Fort Benton after a voyage of 42 days on the Missouri river, From there he went to Helena, Montaa, waere he worked for a time. He also worked for several years in the farming country around Townsend and Deer Lodge valleys. He was employed by the Anaconda Copper Mining company at Batte, working there about eight venrs.

In 1884 he came to the Flathead, leaving Butte by wagon team, accompanied by R. J. Ball and D. J. Lambert. They reached Kalispell in June, 1884 and camped where the Kalispell Flour mill now stands. Mr. O'Boyle pre-empted on 160 acros fronthwest of Kalispell and, with the exception of a few years he returned to Butte to work in the mines, has since made his home here,

He was married on January 24, 1899 to Miss Mary Lavelle and to them were born seven sons and two daughters, His widow, five sons and one daughter are left to mourn his departure. They are: Charles, John, Henry, Francis and Walter and Mrs. Alice Thibort. Also surviving are four grandchildren; two brothers in Ireland; 3 nieces in the United States and a nephew in Winnipeg, Canada. Mr. O'Boyle was a good neighbor and a man of exemplary qualities, His memory will be long revered by all who know him.
