Word has been received in Seattle of the death Tuesday, Feb. 6, of Mrs. Alice Rogers, a pioneer resident of Montana and well-known in Seattle. She died at the home of her sister, Mrs. R. E. Rockwell, with whom she was spending the winter.

Mrs. Rogers, who was Miss Alice Chappel of Canton, was married to Edward Rogers in Minnesota and moved to Montana in the early '80's, going first to Great Falls and later to Kalispell where the couple made their home until after Mr. Rogers' death a few years ago, since then she has made her home with her children in Montana and in this city.

Besides her sister, she is survived by a daughter, Mrs. William Schafer of Whitlash, Montana, and two sons, William J. and R. E. Rogers of Seattle. The body will be brought back to Kalispell for burial in the Conrad Memorial cemetery, the date for the services not having been announced. The Rev. Mr. Rickett of the First Methodist church of Kalispell, of which Mrs. Rogers was a member, will officiate.

According to a wire from W. J. Rogers of Seattle, Mrs. Alice Rogers passed away in the east and the body is being brought to Kalispell and will arrive Sunday afternoon. Mrs. Rogers was a former resident here and the wife of Edward Rogers, who passed away about 20 years ago. Fred Willis Rogers was born April 20, 1863, at Fairview, Illinois. When he was still in his infancy his parents moved to Spring Valley, Wisconsin, where he spent his boyhood. In 1880 he began railroading at Clear Lake, Wisconsin, and in 1887 came to Montana with the Montana Central railroad, now the Great Northern. In 1888 he was promoted to engineer and resigned his position in November, 1896. During the years he worked for the railroad he made his home in Great Falls, Butte and Helena and was well acquainted in those cities.

He was married to Mary Ann O'Shea at Butte, and to this union eight children were born, three of whom died in infancy. Mrs. Rogers passed away at Kallispell September 26, 1929, and a daughter, Mrs. Lillian Sanders, died at Butte, June 21, 1934.

Mr. Rogers purchased his farm northwest of Kallispell in 1898 and moved there with his family in the fall of 1902. He was a member of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers of Whitefish, and also a member of Kallispell B. O. E.

Mr. Rogers suffered a paralytic stroke in October, 1930, but his condition was not critical until April of this year. He passed away at his farm home July 22, aged 73 years. Surviving are two sons and two daughters: Mrs. Hazel Spürzöni of Kallispell, and Miss Ruth Rogers of Butte, Fred B., and Edward D. Rogers of Kallispell, and six grandchildren.
