He is survived by his widow, Mrs. Maude Damon, and two children, Robert Walter and Mary Margaret Damon, his father and mother, Mr. and Mrs. Fred N. Damon of Kallispell; three brothers, R. D. Damon, and Marshall Damon, of Kallispell; and Fred T. Damon, Los Angeles, California, and other relatives.
