Obituary

Charles A. Earhart was born in Canada Feb. 26, 1860. He passed away at Kalispell, Montana, March 29, 1938 at the age of 78 years. He came to the Flathead in 1921 and lived for several years east of the Flathead river and then moved to Whitefish. He was a member of Christian church of Kalispell.

Mr. Earhart was a single man and is survived by two brothers, Daniel Earhart of Missouri and Edward Earhart of Michigan. Also two nephews in Michigan; one niece, Mrs. Mary Kao of Whitefish and one grandnephew, Guy Kao, of Kalispell.

JOSEPH B. EDMINSTER

Death came swiftly to Joseph B. Edminster Sunday afternoon, March 27, at Hood's Canal, where he had gone to revere the memory of his wife who had died on February 12, and whose ashes, had been spread at that point. He had lain some flowers beneath a tree, where they had spent many happy hours, and had just entered his car with his friends, Mr. and Mrs. W. A. Thompson of Seattle.

Funeral services were held Wednesday afternoon at 2 o'clock in the Community church. The body was cremated at South Tacoma, where the Masonic Order gave the last rites, and the ashes taken to Hood's Canal on Thursday to be spread from an airplane at the same spot as were those of his wife.

Mr. Edminster was born on July 16, 1874, at Elkhart, Indiana, and as a child moved to Litchfield, Minnesota, where he attended school and learned his trade as a printer. He was married in 1898 at Hancock, Minn. They came west in 1909 to Kalispell, Montana, and in 1916 to Toppenish, Wash. In 1918 they moved to Sunnyside, where he was employed on a newspaper until 1924, when they went to California. They came to the Sound country in 1925, he working for a year in Chehalis before coming in August, 1926, to Tenino, where he had been employed on The Independent up until the time of his death.

Mr. Edminster was a member of the Masonic lodge, having joined in Minnesota in 1904. He became affiliated with the order in Tenino in 1933, and served as worshipful master in 1936. He was a member of International Typographical Union, No. 723, Kalispell, Montana. He was a member of the Christian church of Olympia. Mr. Edminster has no surviving relatives, and left the bulk of his estate, which amounted to about \$7,000, to the Seattle Orthopedic Hospital.

Edward Eisele was born August 30, 1883, at West Newton, Penn., to Albert and Mary Ann Eisele. In infancy he moved with his parents to Rock Rapids, Iowa, where he grew to manhood. In 1904 he emigrated to Ray, N. D., where he took up a homestead.

On November 16, 1911 he was married to Miss Amelia Anderson. To them were born five children; three sons and two daughters. With the exception of two years when he was mail carrier at Temple, N. D., Mr. Eisele farmed in the vicinity of Ray. In September 1935 he came to Kalispell and located with his son, Walter on a farm eight miles northwest of Kalispell, where he resided until his death. He is survived by his widow, Amelia Eisele; three sons, Walter, Russell, and Wayne at the home place; two daughters, Mrs. John C. Brown of Kalispell, and Mrs. Howard Brist of Whitefish; besides seven brothers and two sisters.

Mr. Eisele passed away Monday, June 13, 1938 at the age of 54 years.
