Obituary

Ray Elmer Marble was born in Big Rapids, Mich., March 8, 1883. He first moved to the state of Washington and then to Montana, where in 1913 he was appointed official Glacier national park photographer for the Great Northern, holding that position until he enlisted in the World war, he went to Rochester, N. Y., where he spent several months at the Eastman Kodak Co. school. He sailed for France October 15, 1918.

He served in the photographic department of the Army Air Service, spending some time at the laboratories in and near Paris. He was promoted to rank of sergeant, December 1, 1918. He returned from France with the 803rd Air Squadron, arriving in New York, June 12, 1919. He was given an honorable discharge at American Lake, Wash., June 28, 1919.

After his release from the army, Mr. Marble continued his work as park photographer, with headquarters at the Lewis Hotel and Belton, until 1923, when he came to Whitefish and opened the Marble Studio.

In 1932 he returned again to Belton, where he owned and operated a studio at the time of his death. In June of 1928 he was married to Miss Laura Whitford, who had been a teacher in the Whitefish schools.

He is survived by his widow and three brothers, Clark, Dale and Glen of Seattle.

The name of Marble has been given a high place in the annals of Montana and Glacier national park by the outstanding work of this man as a photographer. "Marble" photographs, most of which have been copyrighted, are known not only in Montana, but all over the United States and Canada as the work of an artist.

Mr. Marble was a member of the American Legion and of the Masonic Lodge.
