

JESSE YENNE

Funeral services for Jesse Yenne were held Monday afternoon at 2 o'clock at the Waggener & Campbell chapel by Rev. C. F. Kleckner of Central Christian church. During the service Clyde Carr sang two solo selections, accompanied at the piano by Mrs. Carr. Friends acting as pall bearers were E. F. Mauzey, A. B. Horsman, M. L. Tucker, H. L. Brown, J. E. Obituary

Jesse Yenne was born March 22, 1860, at Middleton, West Virginia. When he was six years old, the family moved to Indiana, and some time later located in Kansas.

Never one to follow the beaten trails, he came to the Flathead valley in 1886, when he was 26 and the white settlers were few and venturesome. In 1890, he was married to Martha A. Albritton. He first operated a general store at Egan, and later operated a saw mill near Creston. About 40 years ago, he foresaw the future of the east shore of Flathead lake, and on what became known as Yenne's point commenced the building of his orchard. He passed away December 10, 1938, after 52 years' residence in the Flathead.

He is survived by his widow, one brother, Newton Yenne, of Eugene, Oregon, one sister, Mrs. Jimima Peterson, of Smith Center, Kansas, and by a number of nieces and nephews.

He was a member of the Christian church, and of the Modern Woodmen of America.
