James Finley Beckett, son of William H. and Caroline Todd, was born April 25, 1881, at Camp Point, Ill. He was married to Claire Z. Dovell, Dec. 27, 1923, to which union a son, William H., was born and preceded him in death. Mr. Beckett started working for the Great Northern in 1904 when he was employed as an operator at Fort Browning. Later he transferred to Kalispell where he acted as ticket clerk and operator. Prior to the World War he was moved to the ticket office of the Great Northern at Butte and during the war was with the consolidated ticket office of the Great Northern at Butte. On April 1, 1926, Beckett was appointed traveling passenger agent for the Great Northern, a post he held at the time of his death.
