JUDGE EUGENE McCARTHY

The First Presbyterian church was filled to capacity yesterday afternoon by the many friends who paid tribute to the memory of Judge Eugene McCarthy, whose death occurred at Seattle November 10.

Services at the church were conducted by Rev. Harold C. Stark, and at the grave by the I. O. O. F. lodge in charge of M. F. Spink. At the church there were two solo selections by Clyde Carr, accompanied by Miss Louise Rappier of the organ.

Eugene McCarthy was born in South Amboy, New Jersey on September 12, 1863. He was the son of Eugene B. and Ellen McCarthy, and came to Montana with his parents in 1880. In 1882 his father took a contract for construction work with the Northern Pacific railroad in Jocko Canyon. In 1883 after completion of this contract the family moved to the Flathead valley and settled just south of the present site of Kalispell. As a boy Mr. McCarthy attended the first school in the Flathead with five other pioneer children. As a young man he carried the United States mail from Thompson Falls to Murray, Idaho, and spent several years with the United States Geological survey. In 1891 he homesteaded in the Dayton area, where he remained till his return to Kalispell.

He was elected justice of the peace of Kalispell township in 1916, and was appointed police judge of the city of Kalispell in 1917, and has held both offices ever since. He was also U. S. Commissioner for this district, and served with efficiency and satisfaction in all three capacities. It was always a source of great satisfaction with him that

his decisions were never reversed by a higher court.

Judge McCarthy was always civic minded and steadily devoted his time and energy to the development of Kalispell and the Flathead valley. He was one of the most active members of the Flathead Pioneers' society, for many years served as president and secretary, and devoted much of his time to arranging the programs for the annual meetings.

His death was due to a peculiar misfortune. Last August, with his daughters, he visited the World's fair at San Francisco, and blistered his foot while tramping around the grounds. From this an infection developed, for which he received treatment at a Seattle hospital en route home. He improved and returned to Kalispell, but the infection returned and he went to Seattle for further treatment on October 24. Part of the foot was first amputated, but this failed to check the infection, and it was finally necessary to amputate his leg above the knee, from which operation he was unable to recover.

Judge McCarthy is survived by one son, Duncan McCarthy of Kalispell; three daughters, Kathryn McCarthy of Kalispell, Mrs. Neil Briffelt and Mrs. Stella Markam of Seattle, two step-children, Mrs. Violet Gunderson of Kalispell and Andrew LaLonde of Seattle; three brothers, John, of Arlee, and Charles and Dan of Kalispell, and four grandchildren.

During his long residence in western Montana he formed a host of friends throughout the Northwest. He was a member of the Elks lodge, the Odd Fellows and Knights of Pythias, and was active in many civic organizations.

Interment was in Conrad Memorial cemetery, with Waggoner & Campbell in charge.
