Hannah Pearson was born in a covered wagon between Ohio and Iowa in October 1836. She was reared in Iowa and was married there to John M. Fields. They came to the Flathead in 1905 and made their home at Jessup Mill until 1925 when they went to the Soldiers' home to reside. Mr. Fields died there in 1932. He was a Civil War veteran serving under General Sherman all through the war. Among other important battles he was with General Sherman on his famous march to the sea.

Mrs. Fields was very active and travelled and visited often until a week before her death, which was caused from blood poisoning resulting from a scratch by a pet rabbit.

She is survived by one daughter, Mrs. Susan Kissinger of Cedar Rapids, Iowa, who arrived here just before her death, and one sister, Mrs. Ella Barrett of Iowa. There are also several grandchildren and great-grandchildren and other more distant relatives.

Mrs. Fortin had been in ill health for several years and passed away Sunday, February 4, 1940, at her home at the age of 79 years. She had endured all the hardships of pioneer life on the early frontier.

She is survived by her husband, Octave Fortin, at home, and five sons, two by a former marriage, Edward Ritter-Fortin and Walter Ritter of Trego, and her other three sons, Oscar Fortin of Trego, Mont., Philip Fortin of Billings, Mont., and Lt. Henry Fortin of Washington, D. C., now stationed in Florida.
