Obituary

Emma A. Backus was born February 7, 1860, at Racine, Wis., to Mr. and Mrs. William L. and Mary Backus. In her early youth she moved to Clear Lake, Iowa. There she grew to womanhood and in 1879 was married to Clayton O. Ingalls. They moved to Corvallis, Montana, in 1886 and in 1889 they came to Demersville, where they established the Inter Lake which is now Kalispell's daily newspaper. After Mr. Ingalls' death, Mrs. Ingalls continued the paper herself.

Mrs. Ingalls had always taken a prominent part in the civic and political life of the community even in her advanced years. She was elected by Flathead County in 1919 and again in 1921 to the Montana state legislature where she served efficiently.

Mrs. Ingalls passed away Friday night, May 3, 1940, at the home of her daughter, Mrs. W. T. Winston, in Kalispell. She was 80 years of age. Besides her daughter, Mrs. Winston, she is survived by her two grandchildren, Mrs. M. J. Brunner and Mrs. Guy Clatterbuck of Rollins, and four great-grand children.
