For many years Mr. Prestbye spent the summers in the park in charge of a to mist boat on St. Mary's lake and his genial personality and courtesy are still remembered by tourists returning to the park.

He died Dec. 18, 1940. Surviving are his widow and three sons; Abraham of Kalispell, Emin of Spokane and Grant of Flathead valley.

His death marks the passing of another old-time pioneer who was identified intimately with the history of the Flathcad. He was known as a gentleman of the old school, faithful in his civic duties, upright and honest in all his endeavors and a generous active member of his church.
