The coup-stick was then presented to the family, and the Indians sang their song of farewell. Music was furnished by a quartette composed of Mrs. John Hyde, Miss Veda Oke, Mrs. William Dupras and Mrs. Harry Shortland with Mrs. George Edkins as pianist. Friends serving as casket-bearers were Messrs. Edkins, Jeffries, Morley, Lindhe, Remmon and Hughes, with Messrs. Jennings, Asszman, Dawson, Armstrong, Hutchins, Shannon, Rice, Durpas, and Dorrington serving as honorary bearers. Following the services the remains were shipped to Great Falls for cremation.
