During the four years that the Major had charge of the Blackfeet Indians, their daughter, Kokoa was born, she being the first white child born on the Blackfeet Indian Reservation. She was named Kokoa by the Blackfeet Indian chieftains.

Later the Major came to the Flathead in 1889 with his family. Their son, Charles, was born at Half Moon, Montana.

Sarah Susan Baldwin belonged to the Daughters of the American Revolution, the War Mothers, and was a member of the Episcopal church.

She had very little sickness during her lifetime. The night before she passed away she went to the Liberty theatre, which was her favorite amusement place.

She dearly loved her family and especially her grandchildren. She leaves to mourn her passing her sons, Mark, Charles and Phil, and her daughters-in-law Nettie, Rose and Mildred, and 11 grandchildren.

Dr. Morris M. Bottorf spent his boyhood days in White Pigeon, Michigan where he was born February 10, 1871.

He received his medical training in the Chicago Homeopathic College

from which he graduated in 1894

While at college he met Miss Phebe Anderson, who was also a student at the college. They were married in Chicago in 1894. After graduation from this medical school, they went to Sedalia, Missouri, where they located and practiced for two years. In the spring of 1896 Dr. Morris Bottorf came to Kalispell to look this field over as a possible location. After he had decided to locate here, Dr. Phebe closed up their work in Missouri and came to Kalispell later that same spring. Dr. Bottorf has practiced continuously in Kalispell since that time.

During these long years Dr. Bottorf has been called to practically every home in the valley for professional services. In his early years when road conditions were not what they are today he traveled by horse and buggy many a night when he had almost nothing to guide him in finding the homes he was to visit. His has been an heroic service in relieving pain and suffering at any cost to himself in time and effort. The length of time that often elapses between the moment of vision and the great idea is often great but no hardship ever daunted him in the fulfillment of this vision. These long night drives taught him to know the beat of plain folks' hearts and many homes will be saddened by the news of Dr. Bottorf's death.

Dr. Bottorf has been a life-long member of the Methodist church. During the early days of his practice he was a member of the Methodist choir. Later years, duties kept

him from attending services but he has always been a supporter of this organization.

Death came at 6:45 p. m., March 16. The doctor had been in poor health since Christmas and death came as a result of heart lesion.
