Robert J. Dell was born in Chester, England, August 18, 1856, son of Henry and Elizabeth Fisher Ball. When he was 12 years of age, the family came to the United States and located in Bountifut, Territory of Utah. As a young man, Mr. Ball went to various places in Nevado, and in 1839 he came to Butte, Montana, with a freighting outfit. He remained in Butte and vicinity for four years as foreman for the Alice Mines.

In 1384 he came to the Flathead yalloy and pre-empted 166 acres of land five miles south of where Kulspell now stands. At that time the only nearby settlement was Selish, a post office to which people came for men from points as far distant as the Canadian line. Mr. Ball promoted and helped build the first school house in the Flathead country. The original building now stands in Woodland Parks.

On November 5, 1885, he was married to Jennie Claffin in Helena, Montana. From 1884 to 1893 he divided his time between developing the Flathead ranch and in mining activities in Butte where he was an overseer in the smelter of W. A. Clark.

In 1893 they decided to make their permanent home in the Flathead where Mr. Ball increased his land holdings and developed one of

land holdings and developed one of the finest farms in the valley. They had no children of their own but they educated and helped 14 boys and rils to start out in life.

After the death of Jennie Claffin Poll, Mr. Ball remained in the modern house which he had built across the highway from the large ranch house. This two-story building superseded the criginal homestead log cabin and was a land-mark at Ball's Crossing for many years until it burned.

John Dehlinger was one of the managers before it finally passed into the hands of Jorgensen & Dreessen, befor prohibition, and since then It had had several changes of ownership. The original Kalispell Businessman's club occupied the second floor until the Buffalo block was built, when it moved up there and, remained until its discontinuance rear 20 years ago. Henry Bierman was born January 26, 1860, in Mecklenburg Germany. When he was six years old, his father brought the family, then consisting of three boys and one girl, to America in protest against the military regime which existed in those days. The family settled near Cleveland, Ohio.

In the spring of 1880, lured by the call of the west, he went to Chicago where he worked several months' until he had accumulated enough founds to move on to Kansas City. He remained there until spring, and then went on to Denver. Here he got his first big paying job working in the brickyards at \$3 a day. That fall he moved on to Laramie City. Wyoming, where at last he felt he had found the fabulous west which he was determined to reach. It was here that he got his first experience in the cattle business and his first taste of the rough and ready life of the frontier. -

In May, 1882 he joined the Yellowstone Colony headed for Montana. This was a 32-wagon outfit
plus 100 head of cattle. They reach
ed Colson, near the present site of
Eillings, on June 22, 1882, at the
time the Northern Pacific railroad
was being built. This was just six
years after the Custer Battle which
marked the end of most Indian trop
ble in the territory.

He homesteaded on the Mussel-shell river. Buffalo was the chief source of meat in these days and Mr. Bierman rode the buffalo Fange for a number of years. He told many interesting stories of those days and of the subsequent years when he operated his own freight vagon out-fit up the Musselshell between Bilings and Lewistown:

These were the days of cattle and horse rustling and stagecoach hold-ups which added their bit to the flavor of living on the frontier. Mr. Bierman was intinately associated with one of the most interesting periods of Montana history. After his retirment three years ago, he was persuaded by his family to write an account of his early experiences. Because of his accurate memory these writings should prove valuable as historical source material.

After having done contract work with the Northern Pacific railroad in the vicinity of Butte and later with the Great Northern, he reached the Flathead Valley in June, 1892, after a momentous trip through Bad. Rock canyon with a wagon outfit. He often commented on the contrast between travel in late years and that first trip.

The Flathead Valley looked like the promised land that June day, with its carpeting of lush grass and abundance of water. This, he resolved, was where he would make his home. After several years in the Tobacco Plains county where he was engaged in road building, he took up farming east of the Flatheau river near Creston.

In the fall of 1902 he moved to Kalispell and established the Kalispell Meat Market which he operated until his retirement in February. 1940, at the age of 80. During the 20's he was also engaged in cattle ranching in the Big Draw and for years operated a small ranch a few miles south of Kalispell.

Mr. Bierman was a member of various Montana pioneer associations and a long and faithful meniber of the Masonic Blue Lodge and Commandery. He never lost his love of outdoor life which he acquired during his early freighting days. After his retirement in 1940 he spent a great deal of time fishing and in the fall of 1941 when he was 81 years old, he enjoyed his last hunting trip in the South Fork country, and he got his elk.
