Joseph Mathew Giroux was born in St. Paul, Minnesota, on December 23, 1889, and attended school in New Prague and Owatonna, Minnesota.

At the age of 18 years, he and his father became settlers in Northern Minnesota, where they engaged in logging operations. He started his own saw mill operations in 1909.

He was married to Lillian Kruger in 1918 and to this union four sons were born. In 1926 he and his family moved to Columbia Falls, where he continued with his logging operations, operating the mills and logging contracting in the Flathead valley up to the time of his death.

During the First World War he

spent 14 months in overseas duties, and has since been affiliated with the American Legion.

He was interested in the welfare of his community, and was active in civic affairs, serving on the city council, and as a member of the board of trustees of school District No. 6 for 10 years, serving at the time of his death as the chairman of that board.

He was a member of the Chamber of Commerce, Masonic Lodge, Eastern Star and the American Legion.

Mr. Giroux passed away August 20, 1943 at the age of 53 years. He is survived by his wife, Lillian, and four sons, Donald of Seattle, Washington, Clayton, Dick and Bill of Columbia Falls, and five sisters, Miss Elsie Giroux of Chicago, Illinois, Mrs. Rose Lathrop of Los Angeles, Calif., Mrs. Ruth Potnode of International Falls, Minnesota, Mrs. Cina Peterson of Seattle, Washington, and Mrs. Aurora Eastlund of Tosston, Minnesota.

Andrew Frederickson Grinde was born near Trondhjem, Norway, on Aug. 8, 1866. He came to the United States in 1891 and lived in Minneapolis, Minn., for a year, then moved to the Flathead valley in 1892. He homesteaded in early pioneer days of this community and worked at various trades until the spring of 1912 when he began service on the Great Northern railway as track watchman at Paola, Mont. In 1927 he was married to Mrs. Hilma Sorenson. Upon Mr. Grinde's retirement from the railroad he moved to Whitefish and later to Kalispell to make his home. Mr. Grinde was a charter member of the Bethlehem Lutheran church of Kalispell. He passed away Dec. 18, 1943, after a brief illness at the age of 77 years.

Obituary

Ole E. Grinde was born April 29, 1888 at Trondheim, Norway. He came to Kalispell September 19, 1905 at the age of 17 years. He was a carpenter and followed his trade in and around Kalispell up to the time he enlisted in the first world war and came back to Kalispell and took up his trade again and worked around in Kalispell until 1922 when he left for San Francisco. He worked at his trade up to 1940 when he again enlisted and was stationed at Fort Greeley, Alaska. He held a rank as Sgt. Tech. He spent his first furlough in Kalispell in 1942 and went back to Alaska. On June 11 he took sick and was taken to the Kodiak hospital where he remained until August 9 and was taken to the Barnes hospital at Vancouver, Wash. and later taken to the Baxter hospital in Spokane. On Nov. 9 he received a medical discharge and left for his home in San Francisco where

he contracted pneumonia and passed away at the age of 55 years.

Burial took place Nov. 27 with the Veterans Bureau and the Army chaplain in charge with military service. After the chaplains prayer a squad of soldiers fired a salute followed by taps by the bugler. He was buried in the Golden Gate National cemetery, a cemetery created for casualties of this war.

Mr. Grinde was a single man. He leaves to mourn his loss three sisters and four brothers. Mrs. Chris Iversen, Rt. 2, Kalispell; Mrs. Ole Tovrud of Kalispell and one brother Halvor of Lewistown, Mont.; one sister and three brothers in Trondheim, Norway and one uncle, Andrew Grinde of Kalispell and several nieces and nephews.
