S. L. RIPLEY

S. L. Ripley, geologist and discoverer of the Cut Bank oil field, died suddenly of a heart attack last evening at his residence on Fifth avenue east at the age of 54 years. His death came as a shock to his family and friends. Mr. Ripley is survived by his wife and one son, Robert.

Sherwin Lyman Ripley was born in Easton, Pennsylvania and spent his early youth on a farm. He was orphaned early in life and made his own way, securing an education and teaching school at the age of 16. He then graduated from Lehigh University as a geologist. His post graduate work was done at Chicago University. After this he continued in school work, serving at one time as superintendent of the Idaho Falls school system.

The geology of Montana attracted him to the Shelby district, and in 1929 Mr. Ripley located the Cutbank oil field, and together with Jerome and Joe Drambheller and Martin Woldson of Spokane leased land near Cutbank and drilled the first producing well in the field.

Mr. Ripley and his family came to Kalispell in 1932 and since coming here he has given freely of his time to community affairs. He served all the Flathead County Rationing Board, through last year as Chairman of, resigning recently from that position. Last week he had been elected president of the Flathead county chapter of the American Red Cross. He was keenly interested in young peoples' activities, and had closely followed the progress of the Flathead Braves basketball team of which his son, Robert was a member.
