Laura L. Brice was born January 12, 1873 at Arcadia, Wisconsin. She was married to Albert J. Davis at Ridgefield, Wash., July 3, 1895. Mr. and Mrs. Davis moved to the Flathead in 1917 and made their home in the Creston district until four years ago when they moved to the Fairview district. Mrs. Davis had been ill for several years and passed away at the farm home December 20, 1944 at the age of 71 years.

She had been a member of the Methodist Church since early womanhood.

Mrs. Davis is now survived by her husband, Albert J. Davis at home and her daughter, Mrs. Edra Peters of Columbia Falls and three grandchildren.

LOUISA DENNETT

Louisa B. MacPherson was born at Black Heavon in the suburbs of London of Scottish parents. She received her education in girls' schools in both France and Belgium. She was married in England and to the marriage a daughter Sybil was born. With her first husband and daughter she came to Canada to live in 1874. After the death of her first husband, she married Fred Dennett at Grenfeld, Canada; and from then they came to make their home at the historic Flurry Cattle ranch, just out of Helena, near Wolf Creek. In 1890 they came to the Flathead Valley and purchased the summer home of the former Dr. A. D. Macdonald at Foy's lake where they made their home until Mrs. Dennett's passing on February 23, 1944.

Mrs. Dennett was a good neighbor and a good friend. She had a keen mind, read a great deal and was always interesting to visit with. She was well versed in her history not only of Montana but of her home in England and Canada as well.

Although she was in ill health for some time she would not leave her home at Foy's lake and move to town where she could be closer to medical care, and felt that if she left there she would never return. She was proud of her Scottish ancestry, the Clan of MacPherson, and spoke often of their deeds in past wars as well as those fighting in this war. Those who knew Mrs. Dennett well will miss her, because she belonged to those fine pioneers who ask only the opportunity to live and make a place for themselves in America.

Mrs. Disbrow was born August 25, 1861, in Leroy, N. Y. She was the daughter of Mrs. Forrester McGregor who passed away in Kalispell, May 15, 1927. She was married March 29, 1882, at Nelson Nebr., to Edmund S. Disbrow, who preceded her in death October 31, 1930. She had made her home in Kalispell from 1895 to 1930, residing in New York and Colorado Springs, Colo., between 1930 and 1938, prior to coming to Sheridan six years ago.
