Phillip Faignan was born near Montreal, Canada, April 12, 1869. He became a naturalized citizen of the United States in 1889 at Chippewa Falls, Wis. In 1896 he was married to Miss Amelia K. Trulson and they made their home in Duluth, Minnesota, until 1901 when they came to the Flathead. They lived on the farm northwest of Kalispell where Mrs. Faignan passed away in 1937.

Mr. Faignan passed away May 13, 1944, at the home of his daughter in Tacoma, Washington. He was 75 years old.

Phoebe Elizabeth Hammond was born December 9, 1864, in Schuyler county, Missouri, and passed away September 29, 1944 at her farm home, having reached the age of 79 years.

The family moved to Adair county, Missouri, when she was about three years of age, and she grew to womanhood in that community.

On March 15, 1887, she was united in marriage to George W. Ford, and six children were born to this union, all of whom are living except the youngest son, Benjamin J., who passed away in 1929.

For the first 19 years they lived in the eastern part of Sullivan county, Missouri. In 1906 the family moved to Columbia Falls, Montana, and in August of that same year they moved to a farm six miles south of Columbia Falls, where they have made their home since that time, and where Mr. Ford passed away on August 4, 1936.

She was united in marriage with William Forrer January 12, 1886, and to this union were born four sons and two daughters; five of these children preceeded her in death. Her husband passed away October 29, 1929, at Great Falls, Montana. She came to the Flathead with her son, Oliver, in June, 1930, moving to Half Moon in December of that year.

Mary Elizabeth Forrer was baptized and confirmed a member of the Reorganized Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints, March 1, 1942. She passed away in Kallispell October 22, 1944, at the age of 77 years, and leaves to mourn her son, Oliver, daughter-in-law Betty, five grandchildren, three great grandchildren, a sister, two brothers, several nephews, neices and a host of friends.

George Washington Fuller

George Washington Fuller was born in Indianapolis, Ind., February 22, 1856. At the age of eleven years he moved with his parents to Wisconsin where he grew to manhood and spent a considerable part of his life.

On March 28th, 1875 he was married to Miss Rachel Luella Sutton in Dunn County, Wisconsin. To this union six children were born, three sons and three daughters.

In 1905 Mr. and Mrs. Fuller moved with their family to Oklahoma and in 1910 came to Montana living at Highwood and then at Monarch.
