

JENNIE E. LA HUE

Jennie E. La Hue-Eberhart was born Feb. 25, 1869, in Pettis county, Missouri. She moved with her parents to Iowa at an early age where she grew up and was married to Joseph Paige. Following his death she was again married, to Charles La Hue. They came to Montana to make their home at Great Falls in 1917 and Mr. La Hue passed away there five years ago. Mrs. La Hue then came to Kalispell to live and passed away here Nov. 11, 1944, at the age of 75 years.

She is survived by one daughter, Mrs. Jessie Walath of Kalispell, and one grandson, Cecil Heidlebaugh of Great Falls.

DR. J. ARTHUR LAMB

Dr. J. Arthur Lamb, who was prominent in the affairs of Kalispell for a period of 43 years, died in Kalispell on June 20, 1944. He had practiced medicine in this community from 1901 until his illness this spring.

Born at Ottawa, Ontario, Canada, June 1, 1874, Dr. Lamb graduated from McGill university in Montreal in 1898. After serving at New York Lying-in hospital, he moved to Sand Coulee where he practiced medicine for a year and one-half before moving to Kalispell where he had since resided.

Although a member of the Congregational church, Dr. Lamb was very interested in Christ Episcopal church in Kalispell where he was a member of the choir since his arrival in Kalispell. He served as a vestryman for a number of years.

Dr. Lamb had been a past master of Blue Lodge, past commander of Knights Templar, high priest of Kalispell chapter, Royal Arch Masons and a member of the Eastern Star. He had been active in construction of the Masonic temple which was dedicated on November 30, 1905.

In 1909, Dr. Lamb, married Maud Talbot of Columbia Falls. She passed away in 1921.

Dr. Lamb and Miss Ann Pederson were united in marriage in May, 1942. Mrs. Lamb survives her husband and his sister, Edith Lamb and brother, Walter T. Lamb, of Ottawa, also survive.

Dr. Lamb took an early interest in radio and established the local station. Don Trelour broadcast a splendid tribute to Dr. Lamb at the time of his death. Besides music, photography was a hobby and he was an active worker for Boy Scouts. Dr. Lamb had been president of Oratorio society and belonged to medical associations.

In 1901 the family moved to Montana in a covered wagon. They arrived at Polson on July 3, and were held up over the Fourth as the Indians wanted to use the fine bunch of horses they had brought with them from South Dakota for the rodeo they were staging. They came up the crude trail west of Flathead lake and settled on the place 12 miles northwest of Kalispell where they have made their home since that time until last fall when Mr. Luke's illness forced them to move to Kalispell where instant medical care could be obtained. Mr. Luke had suffered a stroke some eight years ago from which he had never fully recovered, becoming bedfast about a year ago. He passed away last Sunday, February 13, 1944, at the age of 82 years.

Mr. Luke united with the Methodist church at the age of 19 years and remained a faithful member of that church to the day of his death.
