No one ever thought of Leat Prairie without thinking of Pete Ran and he always seemed the heart and core of his entire community, which is certainly one of the most cohesive and mutually helpful communities in Plathead county. To those people Lost Prairie will never again be the same.

But at the same time his faith in the simple things of life will live on in the hearin of his friends and add certainty and permanency to a world now so beact by doubts.
