Obituary

Robert Pauline was born in Greenock, Scotland on October 15, 1871 but at the early age of one and one-half years immigrated to America with his parents to make his home in Canada. At the age of ten, he moved with his parents to St. Paul, Minn., where his father was employed as a railway engineer.

Robert served an apprenticeship as machinist in the railroad shops in St. Paul and when the road built west through Montana, he came west with the construction crew and was employed as an engineer for several years, making his home in Kalispell since 1892.

On June 30, 1897 he was united in marriage to Miss Alice Gates of Kalispell. Four children were born to this union, two of whom survive.

Mr. Pauline began his long career as a public servant as a volunteer fireman and later served as fire chief for Kalispell. He was at one time president of the chamber of commerce; he was the first president and a charter member of the Kalispell Kiwanis club; mayor of the city from 1912 to 1922 and again from 1926 to 1928; master of Kalispell Masonic lodge, president of the State Laundrymen's association; served six consecutive terms in the Montana state senate, from 1919 to 1943. While serving as president pro-tem in the senate he served as acting governor of Montana during the absence of Governor Frank Cooney.

He established the Kalispell Laundry when he retired from the railroad about 1897 and continued in that business until ill health forced his retirement five years ago.

Mr. Pauline became a member of the Kalispell Masonic lodge No. 42, A. F. & A. M., in 1895, and later a Knight Templar in Cyrene Commandery, a life member of the Royal Arch Masons, a charter member of Adah chapter Order of Eastern Star, the Scottish Rite of Hedena, and Algeria Temple, Order of the Mystic Shrine.

Mr. Pauline passed away in Kalispell November 24, 1947, at the age of 76 years. He is survived by his widow, Mrs. Alice Pauline, at the home; one son, Donald Pauline; one daughter, Miss Agnes Pauline of Kalispell; two sisters, Mrs. Samuel Johns of Kalispell and Mrs. R. H. Glennan of Moravia, California, and one brother, George Pauline of Pasco, Wash.
