Funeral services for Rev. Albert Jordan were conducted Tuesday afternoon at 2 o'clock at the Trinity Lutheran church in Kalispell. A very large number of Rev. Jordan's friends gathered at the Trinity Lutheran church and at the Bethlehem Lutheran church to hear Rev. Paul W. Freiburger of Billings and Rev. Emil Zeigler of Helena pay final tribute to the pioneer Kalispell minister. During the services, two selected hymns were sung by the congregation with accompaniment by Mrs. Schocknecht. Brother pastors from about the state who were chosen as casket bearers were the Rev. D. R. Boerke of Butte, the Rev. E. T. Lockhand of Great Falls, the Rev. Paul Ernst of Power, the Rev. Arthur Werfelmann of Libby, the Rev. Robert Maekensen of Missoula and the Rev. Paul Sohn of Hamilton. Honorary pallbearers included officers of the Trinity Lutheran church and other visiting ministers were, William Zeeck, Herman Kienas, William Koenig, Carl Nommensen, Walter Kraft, Mark Schocknecht, the Rev. John Teiertag of Chinook, the Rev. A. Gierke of Hardin, the Rev. John Chambers of Sidney, the Rev. Lev Tornwehjen of Forsyth, the Rev. George Schubarth of Miles City, the Rev. August Hauptman of Great Falls, the Rev. Gustave Wertz of Missoula and the Rev. John Nieman of Wolf Point. Rev. Jordan's interment was made in the family plot in Conrad Memorial cemetery under the direction of the Waggener & Campbell funeral home.

Obituary

Albert Jordan was born in Cleveland, Ohio on May 22, 1892, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Carl Jordan. He grew up in Cleveland and attended the Christian Day school of his home congregation. Having made up his mind to study for the ministry in the Lutheran church, he entered Concordia college at Fort Wayne, Indiana, and upon his graduation in 1909, entered Concordia seminary at St. Louis from which he received his degree in 1912. On August 25, 1912, Rev. Jordan was ordained and installed as pastor and missionary at

Chinook, Montana, a post which he served for six years. While living in Chinook, he was united in marriage to Miss Amanda Jepson on August 2, 1916. In September, 1918, Pastor Jordan received and accepted the call of the Trinity Lutheran church at Kalispell and had labored here faithfully, conscientiously, and successfully since for a period of more than 30 years.

Rev. Jordan served the church at large as president of the Montana Pastoral conference, vice president and president of the North Dakota and Montana District of Lutheran Church Missionary synod. He later declined to accept the presidency of the North Dakota-Montana conference and later of the Montana conference because of poor health.

Mrs. Jordan passed away on January 5, 1942. Rev. Jordan passed away at his home last Wednesday morning, November 3, 1948, at the age of 56 years. Surviving him are his two children, Major Paul Albert Jordan with the Army Chemical Center in Maryland; Dorothea Marie Jordan, student at Washington State college in Pullman, Washington; two grandchildren, William Paul and Richard Allan Jordan; one brother, Rev. Fred Jordan of Terra Haute, Indiana; and by a sister, Mrs. Elizabeth Haber, of Cleveland, Ohio.
