Murder Suspect's Arrest Causes Disbelief, Relief

A feeling of disbelief, shock, and a wary relieved tension crossed Kalispell Tuesday when it was confirmed a murder charge was filed and arrest made which may be the solution to the slaying of Roberta Clark five years ago.

It was in the early hours of the approaching Christmas holiday of 1964 when the body of the 21-year-old Flathead High School French teacher was found three miles from Gallatin Gateway. It was the eve of the New Year's holiday five years later when Orville Archie Warwick. 29, was arrested at Seattle on a bench warrant issued by the 18th District Court charging him with murder.

First word received in Kalispell yesterday was by telephone and word of mouth. It took several hours to confirm the charge as filed by Gallatin County Atty. McKinley Anderson.

Police Chief Ted Waggener

recalled the initial days of the been surprised at the turn of evinvestigation and coordination with Con McClurg, sheriff of Gallatin County in 1964.

Waggener said, "We checked out several leads in Flathead County for him and coordinated the information with McClurg when he made a quick trip up here. To get the word today the charge has been filed and arrest made indicates some good police work on the part of some individuals who have followed this case rather tenaciously. It's a rare thing to come up with an arrest five years after a crime was committed."

Surprise was the feeling of Bette McClintick, 655 Fifth Ave. W.N. She was a student at Montana State University at the time. She said, "I was amazed when I heard the news Tuesday. After five years time and then to find a solution. That's amazing."

A member of the Bobcat football team commented when he heard the news, "This is a real shocker. Warwick was always a different kind of fellow, you know, quiet and he kept to himself pretty much, but he was well accepted by the ball players. This is a tragic surprise."



Miss Clark joined the Flathead High School faculty following her graduation in 1964 and was in her first teaching position. She had taught only the fall term before her death and was using the Christmas holidays to visit her fiance at Bozeman. William Personnen, principal of the high school five years ago, said then, "it was a shame to lose such a capable 'natural' teacher. She was held in high esteem by students and faculty alike."

For a close friend and associate of Miss Clark, the news was "like a recurring nightmare. It was something I thought was deeply buried in my mind. Now it's back again. At least I feel now I shall not have to live it again. I was so sorry for Bobi's parents. Now I feel pity for Warwick's family for the ex-periences they will have to live."
