Train-Car Crash

Train-Car Crash Kills Two Men

LIVINGSTON (AP) — Two men were instantly killed early Wednesday afternoon when the convertible in which they were riding exploded after being hit broadside by a westbound passenger train locomotive of the Burlington Northern.

Highway Patrolman Clarence Owen said the collision occurred one and a half miles east of Livingston at the rail intersection of a lumber yard service road which approaches U.S. 89.

Owen identified the victims as Mark D. Klepich, 22, a native of Red Lodge and the driver of the car; and Terry A. Edwards, 23, a native of Livingston, a passenger.

Owen said the train was not derailed and that train passengers reported no injuries. He said the locomotive was extensively damaged, although it was able to proceed to the Livingston station.

The patrolman said the train engineer, James Thayer, said the car was crossing the track at about 5-10 miles an hour and it looked like the men were talking to each other.

The patrolman said Thayer saw the car at about a distance of 300 yards and attempted to stop. Lumber cars had blocked the view up to that point, Thayer said.

Owen said witnesses heard

the train whistle. Theyer estimated train speed as about 70-75 miles an hour at the point of impact. Owen said.
