The tempermental stove which smoked many congregations and Sunday school students was an oil drum adapted to stove use. It had replaced the church's, first stove is a cast iron one, arranged in order to send heat to the front of the church.

Miss Rayson lived in the old, large parsonage which has since been torn down and replaced by the Methodist Education Building. She was pleased when a congregation member provided her with an icebox for the kitchen.
