Choteau Man Killed In Vietnam

CHOTEAU (AP) — A 1969 graduate of the U.S. Military Academy at West Point and the son of Choteau's mayor was killed in Vietnam March 15 when a grenade exploded in his quarters at a base camp.

Mr. and Mrs. James Dellwo said their 24-year-old son, Army Lt. Thomas A. Dellwo, was to have completed his year in that Southeast Asian country April 12. Prior to reporting to the 101st Airborne Division in Vietnam, they said, Dellwo had participated in the South Vietnamese invasion of Cambodia as an artillery adviser.

Dellwo was born in Great Falls and attended school in Choteau. While in high school he was a National Merit Scholar semifinalist, a Montana Boys' State delegate, letterman in football, basketball and track, and president of the student council and Catholic youth organization.

Dellwo is survived by his wife, Laura, and an infant daughter.

He is the 233rd Montanan reported killed in the Indochina war.
