Bigfork Man Dies In Auto Collision

BIGFORK — An accident early Sunday afternoon claimed the life of Ozroe D. Finch, 76, Bigfork, raising Flathead County's traffic fatality toll to 15 this year.

Finch was killed following a two-car collision two miles south of Bigfork on Montana Highway 85 at 12:25 p.m. Sunday.

Reported in fair condition this morning at Kalispell

General Hospital was the victim's widow, Helen B. Finch, 73, who was a passenger in the car driven by her husband. She is being treated for injuries received when the auto flipped after the crash and landed on its top, pinning her inside.

Driver of the second vehicle was Mrs. Douglas Smith, 33, Bigfork, who received an arm injury, who was treated and released from the hospital.

Montana Highway Patrol reported both cars were southbound when the accident occurred.

The report stated that Mrs. Smith, who was alone, was turning left off the highway into the driveway of her home when Finch attempted to pass her vehicle.

Finch's car struck the left side of the Smith vehicle, slammed into the ditch on the east side of the road and then flipped and came to rest on its top.

Finch was thrown out of his vehicle and his body pinned beneath it. He was pronounced dead at the scene.

Mrs. Finch was pinned partially inside the totally demolished car. Rescuers pulled her from the vehicle and she was taken by ambulance to the hospital.

An inquest will not be conducted.

Finch and his wife reportedly were returning to their home along the East Lake Shore after attending church in Bigfork.

Mr. Finch was born May 20, 1895, at Jericho, Mo., a son of Joseph and Virginia Finch. He had spent his early life and received his education in Missouri and Oklahoma. In 1916, he moved to Eastern Montana and was married to Helen Beryl George May 25, 1919.

He was a veteran of World

War I having served in the U.S. Army in France. Upon his return from the armed services, he was engaged in ranching operations near Miles City until moving to Bigfork in 1954. Mr. Finch was a member of the Assembly of God Church of Bigfork.

He is survived by his widow, Beryl, at home; five sons, the Rev. Dennis Finch of Mountlake Terrace, Wash., William Earl of Omaha, Neb., Joseph W. of Miles City, Lloyd G. of Seattle; and the Rev. Miles Finch of Polson; three daughters Mrs. Ira (Olive) Rodgers of Missoula, Mrs. Albert (Lila) Douglas of Deer Lodge and Mrs. Francis (Bertie) Clowers of Seattle; 25 grandchildren and one great-grandchild.

He is also survived by two brothers, C. O. Finch of Cleveland, Tex., and Carl Finch of Billings and three sisters, Mrs. Rovelina Horsman and Mrs. Odetta Walden, both of Miles City, and Mrs. Thelma Freiheit of Wycoff, Minn.

Funeral services for Mr. Finch will be conducted in the Little Brown Church at Bigfork at 2 p.m. Wednesday. Interment will be in the Lone Pine Cemetery where military graveside rites will be conducted by the veterans of World War I. Arrangements are under the direction of the Johnson Funeral Home.
