Msgr. Michael Halligan Dies At 77, Plan Service

Monsignor Michael J. Halligan, 77, chaplain of Kalispell General Hospital, died at the hospital this morning. He was born in Athlon, Ireland, Jan. 16, 1894, one of 10 children of Patrick and Ellen Galvin Halligan.

After graduation from the National Schools he received his

college education in St. Joseph's College, Wilton, Clark. In September, 1911, he entered St. Patrick's Seminary, Carlow, and was ordained a priest for the Diocese of Helena May 3, 1918, by the Most Rev. Patrick J. Foley, Bishop of Kildare and Leighlin.

Coming to Helena in February 1919 the young priest was sent to the Cathedral of St. Helena to await an appointment. In January 1920 he was appointed administrator of St. Joseph's Parish, Harlowton. He tells that upon arriving in Harlowton he found a delegation awaiting him from Shawmut, one of its missions, informing him of the great need of a church in their

community. Next day he went to Shawmut, purchased a school building and converted it into a church.

In September 1920 he was appointed pastor of St. Michael's Parish, Browning, where he spent 26 years. He built a rectory in 1927. In 1932 with the building of a new church, the name of the parish was changed to that of "The Little Flower" in honor of St. Therese. In June 1946, he was appointed pastor of St. Helena Cathedral, Helena. During his years there he converted the lower auditorium of the cathedral into a social center and built a high school. He was appointed to the Board of Diocesan Consultors and was made Dean of the Helena Deanery in 1947.

In 1949, he was made a Domestic Prelate with the title "Right Reverend Monsignor." Msgr. Halligan was appointed pastor of St. Matthew's parish in Kalispell in September 1956. He became involved in another building program, a new elementary school. Started in 1957 the school was finished in the spring of 1958 and ready for the fall term. The celebration of the Golden Jubilee for Msgr. Halligan took place May 8, 1968.

For the past three years he has served as chaplain for the Kalispell General Hospital. Msgr. Halligan is survived by a number of distant relatives all living in Ireland. Funeral arrangements will be announced by the Johnson Funeral Home.
