Two men died in Monday industrial accidents in Northwest Montana.

Clarence G. Cooper, 30, Avon, was crushed when a bulldozer tipped and rolled on him about 11:15 a.m. on Fire Fighter Mountain in the Hungry Horse Ranger District of the Flathead National Forest.

Kenneth A. Hermanson, Spokane, plunged to death in a fall 90 feet inside a penstock chute at Libby Dam and into 150-foot water depths of the Kootenai River about 12:45 p.m.

Cooper was working for a thinning contractor on the Fire

Fighter Mountain site when the machine apparently rolled up against a log. It then tipped backwards and trapped Cooper underneath the machine. The Flathead County coroner's office does not plan an inquest.

Hermanson's body is apparently trapped on the upstream face in the area of the water quality intake gates of the dam. As of noon recovery attempts with grappling hooks had failed. The Corps of Engineers anticipates divers will have to go into the 150-foot depths to attempt the recovery.

The corps has already convened a board of inquiry to probe the death, the fifth at Libby Dam site and the seventh in the construction work period. Hermanson was on the job for the first day working for R. W. Reed Painters, sub-contractor for Libby Dam Builders. He was working on scaffolding in the penstock chute when he fell.
