

POLSON — Lake County authorities do not plan an inquest into the death of Charles Lorang, about 75, Woods Bay. Coroner-Sheriff Bill Phillips has established cause of death as extensive third degree burns with death occurring likely late Saturday afternoon.

Phillips said there was no indication how Lorang may have been trapped by the fire but he did rule out the possibility of a heart attack. The coroner said there was every indication death was accidental. He speculated from the position of the body Lorang was performing some small task when the flames swept over him and that shock could have been sufficient to overcome the elderly man.
