In November 1958 he was elected Flathead County clerk and recorder and was serving at the time of his death.

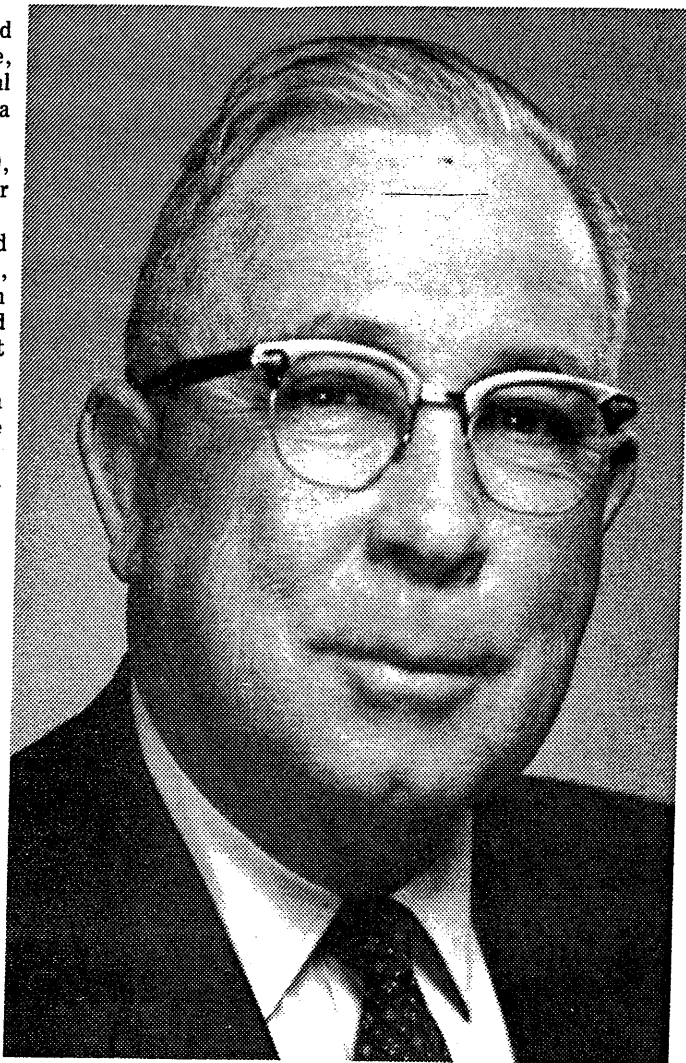
During his terms in office he instigated the microfilming of county records and was instrumental in establishing punch-card voting in order to speed up election returns.
