Mr. Rein died in Great Falls July 12 from injuries received in a one vehicle accident near Columbia Heights July 2.

He was born April 16, 1901 at Washington, Ill., and served in the Navy from 1920 until 1922 and during World War II. He moved to the Flathead in 1922 and was married to Goldie Crowskrey Jan. 30, 1923 at Kalispell. The couple resided in Essex and Summit, where he was employed as a signal maintainer until 1929 when they moved to Whitefish. They owned and operated the Rein Electric and Gift Shop until retiring in 1968.

The Reins camped at Bowman Lake for many years.

Survivors include his widow; one sister, Mrs. Gervin Reed, Washington; and a nephew, Ray Bergan, Kalispell, who lived with the Reins for a number of years. He was preceded in death by an infant daughter.
