Crash kills BN technician

NYACK FLATS — Jay L. Collins, 44, of Cut Bank died in a single vehicle accident reported at 2:30 p.m. Sunday 12 miles east of West Glacier just beyond the Nyack Flats section of U.S. 2.

The Montana Highway Patrol reported Collins was eastbound in his pickup truck and apparently moving too fast for conditions. According to witnesses Collins had passed one vehicle and then lost control of his truck in a sweeping curve. The vehicle failed to negotiate the curve, hitting one side of the guardrail, then going across the roadway, striking another guardrail, vaulting it and rolling into the Middle Fork of the Flathead River.

Jack Thompson and Mike Chapin of the North Valley Rescue Assn. responded to the scene and extricated Collins body from the wreckage of his truck. Damage to the vehicle was set at \$1,500. Collins was a signal maintenance technician for the Burlington Northern.

Authorities said no inquest will be necessary since Collins was alone in his truck and no other vehicle was involved in the fatality.

Collins was one of three persons to die on Montana roadways over the weekend, pushing the state's yearly traffic fatality toll to 149, eight more than on July 10 last year.

Curtis Lee Brown, 18, of Stanley, N.D., was killed early Saturday when his motorcycle left a city street in Circle and slammed through a steel railroad sign, according to the Montana Highway Patrol.

Another man was killed Sunday when the stolen pickup truck he was driving hit another car and rolled several times on a Missoula street, according to Missoula County Sheriff's Sgt. Richard Duke.

Duke, also deputy coroner, pronounced the man dead at the scene.

The man was fleeing from where he had stolen the truck, Duke said, when he hit the rear of a station wagon and rolled almost half a city block. The station wagon's occupants were not injured.

The man has not been identified, Duke said, although the man is believed to be from the Seattle area.
