### Conat falls to death

Twenty-nine year old Robert Conat of Whitefish was killed Friday when the hang glider he was flying near Bozeman collapsed in mid air.

The accident occurred at about 1 p.m. after Conat had taken off in a motorized glider from Sourdough Ridge on the city's east side.

Funeral services were conducted at the Austin Funeral Home in Whitefish Tuesday. The body was cremated.

According to witnesses, Conat had been flying at about 1,500 feet taking aerial photographs and pulling a promotion banner for an outdoor concert when the wings appeared to collapse. It was the opinion of fellow pilots that the accident was caused by a structural failure of the easy-rider glider, a bi-plane design.



18 may 1979 ert Conat of Friends said Conat had been active in hang gliding since 1974, and had been flying daily at the time of the mishap. He had been a pioneer in motorized gliders, and had the first successful motored glider in the state. He had built several gliders from kits, and had been flying the current design for two years, they said.

> Conat was said to have been an excellent self-taught pilot, and was very safety conscious. He had flown from Teakettle and the Big Mountain many times, they said.

The pilot was a Whitefish High School graduate, and attended Montana State University at Bozeman. He served with an Army Ranger unit in Vietnam, and upon honorable discharge returned to Whitefish where he was in the construction business.

Conat was also a ski patrolman on Big Mountain, and was an excellent crosscountry skier. He had given seminars at Columbia Falls and Whitefish, and was a forerunner in Telemark skiing techniques.

According to friends, there are only about 50 motorized gliders in the United States. At the time of his death, Conat had been working on a parachute design for hang glider pilots. Fellow pilots said he was very highly respected in the hang gliding community, and an innovator in the motorized glider.

He is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Roy Conat, Jr.. of Hinkley, Minnesota; grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Roy Conat, Sr., of Olney, two sisters, Mrs. Carol Johnson, New London, Minnesota and Candace Conat. Hinkley; an uncle, Don Conat of Los Gatos, California, an aunt, Mrs. Dorothy Graham of Whitefish, and cousins.
