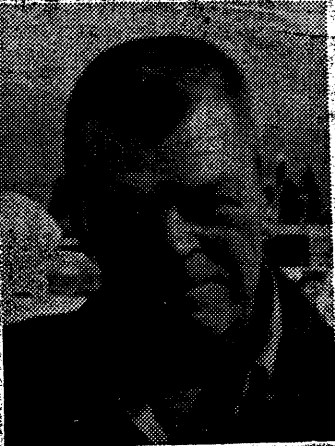
He is survived by two daughters, Mrs. William (Susan) Weaver, Kalispell and Mrs. Walt (Cathy) Clark,
