Former legislator, woman of year Ora Halvorson succumbs at 66

Ora Halvorson, former state legislator and longtime Kalispell resident, died Monday at her Woodland Avenue home following an extended illness. She was 66.

She served in the Montana House of Representatives from 1972 to 1978, representing District 16. Her interests at the Legislature included taxation and highway safety. She introduced the coal tax bill in the House.

Mrs. Halvorson was the Montana representative to the White House Conference on Youth in 1960 and 1970.

Mrs. Halvorson was born Dec. 31, 1913, in Ames, Iowa, a daughter of Harry and Plona Johnson. A few months later she returned with her family to their homestead in Fergus County. She was a graduate of the Lewistown High School and the Billings Business College. She was then employed as a secretary by the Yellowstone County Agricultural Adjustment Administration.

On June 29, 1935, she married Stanley Halvorson in Livingston. The couple lived in Billings until 1937, when they moved to Kalispell. They later spent four years in Choteau and

three years in Hamilton following her husband's position with the Montana Extension Service. They returned to Kalispell in 1946, and have lived here since then.

Mrs. Halvorson was a member of the first graduating class of Flathead Valley Community College, and then attended Goddard College in Vermont to earn a bachelor's degree in political science and history.

Mrs. Halvorson was always active in community and civic affairs and was PTA president at the time

her children were in school. She served as Polio Foundation Drive chairman, as well as chairman of several other civic groups. She was chosen Beta Sigma Phi "Woman of the Year" in 1963. She was a member of the First Presbyterian Church, past president and life member of the Century Club, past president of the American Home Department, and a member of the Farmers Union and the Eastside Grange.

Mrs. Halvorson was preceded in death by one son, Lowell, in 1972, her father and one brother, David Johnson. She is survived by her husband, Stanley, Kalispell; three sons, Wayne, Portland, Ore., David, New York City, N.Y., and Kevin, Los Angeles, Calif.; a daughter, Dr. Karen Sue Miller, St. Louis, Mo.; her mother, Plona Johnson, Lakeside; two sisters, Mrs. Henry (Jean) Good, Kalispell; and Madge Schuck, Seattle, Wash.; seven grandchildren; and several nieces, nephews, aunts and uncles, including Peter DeWinter, Somers.
