Frozen body discovered; identified as Eureka man

WOLF POINT (AP) - A frozen body found along the Missouri River southwest of here was identified as that of a Eureka man, Roosevelt County Sheriff Don Carpenter said.

Ken H. Tester, 53, died of hypothermia, said Carpenter, who added that Tester probably died prior to Christmas Eve when the area's only snowfall covered the body. He said there was no suspicion of foul play.

The body was found Sunday afternoon by a group of hunters. Tester's body was in a sleeping bag covered by a second sleeping bag, the sheriff said.

Tester was apparently camping in the area,

Carpenter said, because he had plenty of "good quality" camping gear with him.

The sheriff said an investigation was continuing into how long Tester had been camping and why he was carrying so much money.

A bank book found on Tester's body showed he had made two withdrawals from his account in a Kalispell bank, Carpenter said. The first withdrawal was for about \$400 in September and the second was for \$1,000 on Nov. 3, the sheriff said.
