Kalispell woman dies in Glacier Park mishap

GLACIER NATIONAL PARK — A Kalispell woman died Friday in a fall from Haystack Creek in Glacier National Park while walking through a culvert below the Going-to-the-Sun Road.

Lisa Handford, 20, who lived at 1225 Fourth Ave. E., was pronounced dead at the scene about a mile east of the Weeping Wall.

Park management assistant Alan O'Neill said the woman and a companion, Curtis Reber, 27, Kalispell, were returning from Logan Pass and stopped at the popular scenic turnout at Haystack Creek at about 6 p.m.

The couple took off their shoes to wade in a small pool on the uphill side of the road, then decided to climb down along the fast-moving creek and walk through a rock-faced culvert to get a better view.

About a third of the way through, O'Neill said the woman lost her footing on the moss-covered rocks and was swept away. Reber tried to grab her, but lost grip on her clothing, he said.

She was swept through the tunnel and over the cliff. She fell about 45 feet and landed on rocks below the falls. She probably died instantly from head injuries, he said.

Reber scrambled down a nearby slope and tried to revive her. He later flagged down a motorist to notify park officials who recovered the body.

The fatality is the second this year, including the June drowning death of a 13-year-old girl at Avalanche Creek.

The woman's body was taken to Johnson Mortuary.
