After attending convent, she trained and worked as a governess in Vienna, Austria. When she was 22, she came to the United States and lived in Ohio and Michigan. Because there were no openings for a governess, she worked as an upstairs maid and cook for various wealthy families. During World War I, she became a member of the American Ironworkers Union when she worked as a molder in a factory in Cleveland, Ohio, making airplane parts.

She married Charles Iverson in 1928 in Cleveland. They moved to Kalispell and Iverson worked on road construction in Glacier National Park. They later moved to Alaska, and to Portland, Ore., during World

War II

In 1945, they returned to Kalispell for a short time before moving to Lakeside. In 1948, the couple opened a restaurant in Lakeside, known as "Magda's Cookie Jar," which they operated until 1960.
