



He said fishing gear, soda pop sandwiches were found in the craft.

LaBonty said he was not sure whether the two men were headed up- or down-river, but they had vehicles parked both at the mouth of the upper river where it spills into Hungry Horse Reservoir, and at th Bear campground.

The two men apparently put water sometime before noon.

LaBonty said an unidentified couple witnessed the accident. He couple was camped on the west sh river and were standing on the when they saw the accident.

He said a third person, who als identified, spotted two bodies in downstream from where the acc curred. That man signaled Fores road crews at work on the east shor help.

The road crews relayed wor accident by radio to the ranger Spotted Bear, he said, where the e message was passed on to a happened to be dropping off camp airstrip near Spotted Bear. Wo accident finally reached the sherif ment at 12:40 p.m.
