Trego man's body found after 3 years

Authorities say they are satisfied that skeletal remains discovered last year near the Flathead-Lincoln county line were of a Trego man who disappeared in 1983.

Lincoln County Coroner Mel Vial said an investigation by county sheriff's deputies indicates the remains were Kevin Zace, who had been missing since June 14, 1983.

Vial said he officially pronounced Zace dead this week, after conferring with the county attorney's office. The death has been ruled a suicide.

Hunters found the remains, still draped in tatters of clothing with a rifle nearby, on Nov. 3, 1986. The discovery was made near the Basin Creek Road, about 15 miles west of Olney and 21/2 miles from the north portal of the seven-mile-long Burlington Northern tunnel.

According to a report Vial received from the sheriff's department on

Monday, the clothing and rifle belonged to Zace.

The rifle contained an empty cartridge. Because of that, because Zace was distraught when last seen, and because there was no evidence of foul play, authorities are treating the death as a suicide, Vial said.

A Missoula pathologist determined that the bones belonged to a male of

about Zace's age and size.
