Einar Offerdahl, 89, formerly of Lakeside and a resident of Immanuel Lutheran Home for the past two years, died Thursday morning in Kalispell Regional Hospital.

He was born Jan. 31, 1895, in Ofredal, Norway, a son of Ola and Severina Offerdal. He received his education in Norway and when he was 17 came to America to join his three brothers homesteading near Conrad. He took a job preparing railway bed from Vaughn Junction to Choteau. He was a cowboy for Sen. Tom Larson and for three years broke horses used on the ranch and sold to homesteaders. In 1916, he filed on his own homestead east of Conrad.

In 1918 he joined the U.S. Army at Fort Benton and served in the infantry until receiving his honorable discharge in 1919 at Camp Lewis, Wash. He returned to the Larson ranch for a time before becoming a bus driver for Whitworth College in Spokane.

On Dec. 28, 1921, he married Ida Rosvold in Spokane. They moved to Great Falls, where he worked for the smelter and later drove cab. He drove for Jack Dempsey on his way to the famous fight in Shelby in 1923.

In 1924, the Offerdahls moved to their homestead at Conrad and farmed there until 1960. They then build a home at Lakeside. For many years they spent their winters in Arizona.

Mr. Offerdahl was a member of the Eidsvold Lutheran Church of Somers; Elks Lodge; Eagles Lodge; Scandinavian Fraternity of America; Sons of Norway; and the World War I Barracks.

He was preceded in death by his wife, Ida, on April 26, 1978.

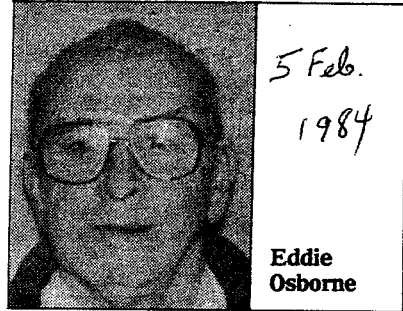
